and in all places. (Mosiah 18:8-9)

And the people's response to this was not a half-hearted, acquiescence. No! The scripture says that: "...when the people had heard these words, they clapped their hands for joy, and exclaimed: This is the desire of our hearts!" (Mosiah 18: 11)

In other words, the people were genuinely excited to be part of that Zion community! But why wouldn't they be excited? Remember what kind of community they were coming from under King Noah and his wicked priests. What a relief the people of Alma must have felt at the Waters of Mormon to know that there was a *much better* way to live and that they could be part of that community! It felt like we experienced a sample of that same enthusiasm on Sunday!

So, what would it really take to build a Zion-like community right now in the Olympus Cove Ward?

To help answer that, Alisa led a beautiful discussion about one of the key characteristics of a Zion community as described in Enoch's time, namely that in addition to having "one heart, one mind, and living in righteousness", there were "no poor among them" (Moses 7: 18). She pointed out that although there are not many temporally "poor" in our neighborhood, there are many who may be poor in spirit, poor in health, poor in friendship, poor in confidence, poor in faith, or poor in understanding. And that in order to build a Zion community, it is incumbent on each of us to reach out to those around us who may be poor in any way.

President Nelson said:

"God wants us to work together and help each other. That is why He sends us to earth in families and organizes us into wards and stakes. That is why He asks us to serve and minister to each other. ... We can accomplish so much more together than we can alone.

"God's plan of happiness would be frustrated if His children remained isolated one from another...

"If you know of anyone who is alone, **reach out**—even if you feel alone too! You do not need to have a reason or a message or business to transact. Just say hello and show your love. Technology can help you... Each precious child of God needs to know that he or she is not alone!" (What We Are Learning and Will Never Forget — April 2021, General Conference)

To that end, the Bishopric, the RS Presidency, and the Elder's Quorum Presidency would like to invite every person in ward

who has a ministering assignment to meet with each of their assigned individuals or families in a Face-to-Face visit at least once during the months of July and August. We want every family or individual in our ward to know who their ministering brothers and/or sisters are and know that they know they care about them. This may seem like one small step, but it feels like what we need to do to begin to build and sustain the moment we have felt toward making the Olympus Cove Ward a true Zion community on earth today!

I testify of God's reality and His divine love for each and every person! And, I echo President Nelson's comments – that we are not organized into groups on accident. Our Heavenly Father knows that when we can learn to truly love and serve each other our hearts will be lifted, and we will find the excitement, the joy, and the peace we have been promised in Zion!
